## OAK SAVANNA RESTORATION PROJECT

NORTA has entered into an agreement with Fulton Soil and Water Conservation District in an oak savanna restoration project on 18 acres of NORTA property. The property is located at northwest corner of Fulton County Roads F and 10, just south of the railroad tracks and behind the Worthington steel plant. This property came into NORTA possession as part of the Wabash Cannonball Trail corridor although it is north of trail about 1/3 mile. Years ago, when the railroad was operating, this 18 acres contained a spur and switching yard that joined our tract, now trail, to the tracks that are in use today. NORTA had previously leased this parcel for agricultural use.

The parcel was taken out of farming in 2009. Under a 30 year agreement with Fulton Soil and Water, it has become a part of their CREP (Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program). CREP is a joint State-Federal conservation partnership program targeted to address water quality, soil erosion, and wildlife habitat issues related to agricultural use. CREP is administered by USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA), through our local Fulton Soil and Water Conservation District.

This program is attempting to reestablish an oak savanna similar to what occupied the land before it was settled, clear cut and farmed. NORTA provided the land and the funds to plant native grasses (spring of 2010). Then, this November 438 pin, white, black, and burr oak trees were planted. NORTA is reimbursed for a portion of the cost of grasses and trees and then will be paid a fee each year for the next 15 years for the land used for this project.

Fulton Soil and Water planted the grasses and trees. In the past 3 weeks a NORTA work crew including Jay Budde, Tom Duvendack, Lucille Smith, Bonnie Markley, Dan Becker, Edith Trowbridge, Tom Striggow and his granddaughters, Tara and Whitney Striggow completed the job, with mulching all the trees (half of the mulch was donated by D&D landscape of Bowling Green), cutting and then installing plastic field tile (250 feet of which was donated by Steve Schmitz, Lyons, OH.) around trunks of trees to protect from rabbits and mice, who had already started chewing on the tender bark.

A welcome assist by Mother Nature gave some much needed rain just after trees were planted. Come next spring Mother Nature and NORTA will need to provide 5 gals of water per week per tree from May 15th to Nov. 15th. This rate is the recommendation of a certified arborist. The field will need to be mowed 2-3 times between early May to mid-late June. The mowing is designed to keep undesirable plants down and be finished before the main bird nesting in the area.

This project is providing a large increase in income from this parcel to NORTA over the farm income we had been receiving and is helping to maintain, and in this case increase, the original oak savanna in this region which is a good thing for Mother Earth. Be sure to stop by and view the native flowers, which will be in bloom in mid summer.

It was our first heavy frost on the morning that I met my oldest son, Scott, at the South Fork to do some brush cutting just west of Neapolis. This area is not easily accessible to our mowing tractor so it was beginning to grow shut except for a 4 foot wide section that the ATVs were keeping beat down.

We began with me manning the chain saw and my son, the loppers. As I cut, he pulled and threw off the cuttings. With the 2 of us the work went fast and it helped to have most of the foliage off what we were cutting.

It didn't take long for the sun to warm the air, as well as us, as the frost dripped away under the clear blue skies, a perfect fall day. We cut into the north side of the trail about 4-5 feet. First Energy has power lines that run along this section of trail on the south side. They come and clear-cut the section under the lines about every 3-4 years so we worked the north side.

After 3 hours we had cleared about half of a mile, by then it was noon and my son had to leave. Also, I had had enough of the chain saw noise and dust for the day.

Tom Duvendack and I returned the next week with the tractor to mow and continue clearing the remaining half mile. I had removed a post-barrier at the east end to allow us to access this section of trail easier with a tractor so in the future we can keep it mowed down.

I also hauled out a load of junk that had been dumped off on Henry County Rd 2, which is a dirt road at west end where we stopped brushing.


